Discussion with others: We've discussed this course with Writing and Rhetoric and Sociology. There are no conflicts.

Rationale: The addition of this course widens the university's curriculum to include techno-political interpretation.

Discussion with others: We've discussed this course with Philosophy, Interdisciplinary Studies, Anthropology, and the Center for Humanities and Digital Research. There are no conflicts. Rationale: Over the years I have been working through service learning course that partner with museum to create digital content and exhibits. These courses have been taught through other content area courses where the theory and literature of curation is only briefly covered. This course will allow students to explore the role of the history museum and curation in the digital age.

CAH-LANG FRT 3XXX 3(3,0) French Translation and Interpretation: PR: FRE 3300 and FRE 3420 or FRE 4422. Explores the basic concepts of English/French, French/English translation and interpretation. Occasional. Abbrev: (30 of 30 chars) FRE Translation Interpretation

Rationale: We are the only department teaching French. We do not have an existing course in translation. This course will be the first of a series created for the French certificate in translation, currently in creation.

FRT 4XXX **CAH-LANG** Field Research in Sociolinguistics: PR: FRE 1121C. An interdisciplinary seminar to introduce students to the tools and concepts of qualitative sociological, cultural and linguistic field research. Occasional.

Abbrev: (29 of 30 chars) Fld Research Sociolinguistics

Discussion with others: We've had discussions with Sociology and English. There are no conflicts.

Rationale: This course provides field research training for all humanities majors and minors, and Is intended to fulfill a need in linguistics in the French Program.

Rationale: This course will allow students an opportunity to perform modern works and work with contemporary composers to expanded their repertoire.

Film Marketing and Exhibition: PR: Film BA or Film BFA major. The process of film festival marketing is examined and practiced in conjunction with local film festivals. Spring. Abbrev: (29 of 30 chars) Film Marketing and Exhibition

Rationale: The Enzian Cinema holds the Florida Film Festival every spring and our students work with the festival contestants to learn how to market films. The Film Producer course has been the stopgap when the Guerilla Marketing course expired. We want to keep Film Producer as a regular class about producers, and introduce this course to become the festival experience.

Real-world Cloud Computing systems and tools, such as OpenStack, Amazon/Microsoft/Google public cloud systems, as well as Hadoop and Spark. Spring.

Spring. Abbrev: (26 of 30 chars) Introduction to Randomness

Rationale: It contributes to our power and energy track by giving an overview of energy issues to undergraduate students who are interested in pursuing energy career after graduation. Formerly taught as a special topics course.

EEL 3XXXL ECS-ECE

Junior Design: CR: EEE 3307C and EEL 4742C. Preparatory skills are developed for Senior Design: Engineering design requirements specifications, test equipment utilization, microcontroller development tool usage, schematic capture and PCB design tools. Spring, Fall.

Abbrev: (13 of 30 chars) Junior Design

Rationale: This course prepare student for their Senior capstone design courses. This course provides and introduction to project definition through development of appropriate engineering design requirements specifications. Analog hardware design, test equipment utilization, microcontroller development tool usage, schematic capture and PCB design tools. These ECE skills are utilized in the Senior Design course sequence.

EEL 4XXX

3(3,0) Post-CMOS Devices and Circuits: PR: EEE 3342C with a grade of "C" (2.0) or better and EEE 3307C. Post-CMOS device technologies for next-generation energy efficient memory and logic designs. Fall.

Abbrev: (30 of 30 chars) Post-CMOS Devices and Circuits

Rationale: As Complementary Metal Oxide Semiconductor (CMOS) technology begins to face significant scaling challenges, both academia and semiconductor industry begins to explore emerging post-CMOS device technologies for next-generation energy efficient data storage and information processing. It will make our ECE students more competitive in the future job market.

EIN 4XXX ECS-IEMS Facilities Planning and Work Design: PR: STA 3032 with a grade of "C" (2.0) or better. Introduces fundamental concepts in facility planning, material handling systems and work analysis/design including work space/flow analysis, layout, warehousing operations and work measurement. Fall.

Abbrev: (33 of 30 chars) Facility Planning and Work Design

Rationale: Currently we have 2 courses (EIN 3314 and EIN 4364) for a total of 6 hrs. This change will allow content to be more focused and line up with other BSIE programs. This change eliminates prereqs/timing issues which in some cases extend the time to graduation.
